LEGAL DEFINITITIONS

The following general definitions are provided to assist you in your understanding and to aid you in your decision to proceed.

I. Marriage/Divorce

<u>Annulment</u> (or more correctly "nullity of marriage" or "nullity of domestic partnership") is when a court says your marriage or domestic partnership is NOT legally valid. A marriage or domestic partnership that is incestuous or bigamous is never valid. Other marriages and partnerships can be declared "void" because:

- of force, fraud, or physical or mental incapacity;
- one of the spouses or partners was too young to legally marry or enter into a domestic partnership; or
- one of the spouses or partners was already married or in a registered domestic partnership.

Annulments are very rare. If you ask to have your marriage or domestic partnership annulled, you will have to go to hearing with a judge and prove the grounds (reasons) that you alleged on the Petition.

Divorce (more correctly called "dissolution of marriage" or "dissolution of domestic partnership") ends your marriage or domestic partnership. After you get divorced, you will be single, and you can marry or become a domestic partner again.

Legal Separation does not end a marriage or domestic partnership. You cannot marry or enter into a partnership with someone else if you are legally separated (and not divorced). A legal separation is for couples that do not want to get divorced but want to live apart and decide on money, property, and parenting issues. Couples sometimes prefer separation for insurance or religious reasons.

<u>California Residency Requirements</u> To file for divorce in California, either you or your spouse must have lived in:

- California for the last 6 months, AND
- The county where you plan to file the divorce for the last 3 months.

If you and your spouse have lived in California for at least 6 months but in different counties for at least 3 months, you can file in either county.

<u>**Community Property</u>** Community property is everything that a husband and wife or registered domestic partners OWN TOGETHER, even if the property is held only in one spouse's name.</u>

<u>**Community Obligations**</u> Community obligations are the debts that a husband and wife or registered domestic partners OWE TOGETHER, even if the debt is held only in one spouse's name.

<u>Separate Property</u> Separate property is everything that a husband or wife or registered domestic partners OWNS SEPARATELY. In most cases that includes:

- a. anything that you owned before you got married or registered as domestic partners;
- b. anything you earned or received after your separation; and
- c. anything that either of you received, as a gift or by inheritance, at any time.

<u>Separate Obligations</u> Separate obligations are the debts that a husband or wife or registered domestic partners OWE SEPARATELY. In most cases that includes the same categories as Separate Property:

- a. anything that you owed before you got married or registered as domestic partners; or
- b. anything you became indebted for after your separation.

<u>Separation Date</u> The date of separation for divorces or registered domestic partnerships is when one spouse (or both) or one partner (or both) decides that the marriage or partnership is over and takes some actions to show this (like moving out of the house).

II. Child Custody and Visitation

Custodial Parent The parent that has primary care, custody, and control of the child(ren).

<u>Custody Mediation</u> A meeting with a trained, neutral third party who helps the parents try to agree on a parenting plan for their children.

<u>Parenting Plan</u> A detailed custody and visitation agreement that says when the child will be with each parent and how decisions are made. The parenting plan may be developed by the parents, through mediation, with the help of lawyers, or by a judge after a trial or hearing.

<u>Supervised Visitation</u> Visitation between a parent and a child that happens in the presence of another specified adult. The court may order supervised visitation when there has been domestic violence, child abuse, or a threat to take the child out of state.

<u>Child Custody</u> The rights and responsibilities between parents for their child(ren). A parenting plan must describe the <u>legal custody</u> and <u>physical custody</u> that is in the best interest of the children. This term is also often used to describe who the children live with.

Legal Custody A parent's right and responsibility to make decisions about a child's health, education and well-being. There are two types of legal custody orders: joint legal custody and sole legal custody.

<u>Physical Custody</u> Where the children live, who takes care of them, and how much time they spend with each parent. There are two types of physical custody arrangements: <u>primary or sole physical custody</u> and joint or shared physical custody.

Joint Custody A court order that gives both parents legal and physical custody of a child.

Joint Legal Custody A type of court order that allows either or both parents to make important decisions about a child's health, education, and well-being.

Joint Physical Custody A type of court order in which a child spends about the same amount of time living with both parents.

<u>Sole Legal Custody</u> A type of court order in which one parent has the legal authority to make the major decisions affecting the child, such as decisions regarding: health care, education, and religion. If the parents do not agree on a decision about the child, the parent with sole legal custody has the right to make the final decision. "Sole custody" does not give one parent the right to move away with the child without notice to the other parent unless the court order specifically gives that right.

<u>**Primary Physical Custody</u>** A type of court order in which a child lives with one parent more than the other parent.</u>

III. Child and Spousal Support

Support Order A court order for the support of a child, spouse or domestic partner. A support order can include monetary support; health care; payment of debts; or repayment of court costs and attorney fees, interest, and penalties; and other kinds of support.

- a. <u>**Child Support**</u> Money paid by a parent to help support a child or children.
- b. <u>Spousal Support</u> Court-ordered support of a spouse or ex-spouse; sometimes also referred to as "maintenance" or "alimony."

IV. Miscellaneous

Declaration A sworn, written statement that is used as evidence in court. The statement supports or establishes a fact. The person that makes the declaration certifies or declares under penalty of perjury that the statement is true and correct. The person that makes the declaration is called the "declarant." The declarant must sign and date the declaration. The declaration must also say where the declaration was signed or that it was made under the laws of the State of California.

<u>Commissioner</u> A person chosen by the court and given the power to hear and make decisions in certain kinds of legal matters.
